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# Featured Program: DOT Support Center (DOTSC)

This month's featured program is the <u>DOT Support Center (DOTSC)</u>. DOTSC provides engineering/technical/management analysis and support to transportation managers ensuring the safe and efficient movement of people and commerce.

DOTSC provides intellectual capital to the North Dakota Department of Transportation and its partners to solve complex problems and address regional issues in the areas of engineering design, information technology, and asset management. The center advances workforce development and includes a student roadway design section supervised by on-site DOT design engineers along with an information technology section for support and application development. These sections provide real-life experience for engineering and information technology students so that upon graduation they bring valuable marketable experiences to employers.

This program is a collaboration between the Upper Great Plains Transportation Institute (UGPTI) and the North Dakota Department of Transportation (ND DOT) for the purpose of:

- Training students through real-world projects
- Encouraging engineering students to enter the transportation engineering field
- Providing a portal to the intellectual capital of NDSU
- Contributing intellectual and technical knowledge of NDDOT staff to student development
- Providing a resource for the development and research in specialty areas of transportation engineering and management
- Interfacing potential information technology and engineering employees with Department of Transportation policies and practices prior to graduation
- Providing technical training specific for transportation procedures and practices

According to Program Director Brad Wentz, P.E., a top benefit to the tribal community could be the recent development of GRIT.

"One of the more recent transportation technology applications developed for local governments was the Geographic Roadway Inventory Tool (GRIT). GRIT offers local and tribal transportation agencies in North Dakota a very easy-to-use web-map-based tool to manage their road and bridge assets. Additionally, DOTSC is heavily invested in preparing future engineers with real-time experience. The center offers opportunities to shadow engineers in the field and deal with real-time transportation issues.

Finally, the center has built an Information Technology (IT) program that targets computer science and management information systems. This familiarizes students with general IT issues and government IT systems, encouraging them to stay in North Dakota to use the tools of their trade. DOTSC IT interns work on actual NDDOT projects, throughout the year.

Pedestrians account for more than 17.5% of all fatalities in motor vehicle crashes, and the majority of these deaths occur at uncontrolled crossing locations such as midblock or unsignalized intersections. These are among the most common locations for pedestrian fatalities generally because of inadequate pedestrian crossing facilities and insufficient or inconvenient crossing opportunities, all of which create barriers to safe, convenient, and complete pedestrian networks. Join this class to discuss countermeasures to keep pedestrians safe at uncontrolled crossing locations.

The Summer Transportation Internship Program for Diverse Groups (STIPDG) provides a unique opportunity to gain valuable professional experience and skills that will complement your academic pursuits. This hands-on program is designed to mentor and cultivate tomorrow's leaders, strengthen their understanding of the transportation industry and prepare them for future public service opportunities.



The STIPDG is a paid internship program open to all qualified candidates without regard to their race, gender, color, religion, sexual orientation, national origin, age, physical or mental disability, veteran status, or any other characteristic prohibited by state or local law.

This program is offered to a variety of students in various stages of their education and careers. Undergraduate applicants from junior, tribal, or community colleges **must** have completed their first year. This provides an opportunity for tribal students to earn a paid internship early on in their college careers.

The application period is currently closed but will open soon. Application deadlines are typically in January with an award notification shortly thereafter. Internship work for 10 weeks during the summer.
